From the Women*s Captain

Hilary term has been a great success for W1. With three freshers in the boat, two of which had never rowed before, the crew came on in leaps and bounds from trails at Dorney in January to finishing third on the river in March. Everyone in the crew has been very motivated and enthusiastic, with everyone's competitive spirits boasting morale on the ergs, in the weights room, and on the water.

We started the new year with IWL-C. Conditions were windy and the stream was strong. At certain points in the race, it was difficult to distinguish between the tideway and the Isis! Fortunately for us, our race went ahead with limited disruption, however, the subsequent divisions were called off due to bad weather and sinking launches! It was a chaotic way to start the term, but on paper, we were the fastest women's college. Despite there not having been many boats that ended up racing, we used this as a springboard to leap from for the rest of the term.

All of the crew went above and beyond what was expected from them in terms of training. Whether that be 4 am weights sessions or weekend half marathons, we knew we would have to put the extra effort in to defend our position on the river and it was clear we did not lack the motivation.

We are also indebted to our coaches, Jono, Mark, and Pippa, who were able to guide the crew to reach our full potential, whether that be giving us pointers on the water to overseeing our land training.

The first big event was Bedford Head. The crew was entered twice and performed well on both occasions. In both cases, we were faster than our M2, and we were the second fastest Oxford college apart from Oriel. With them being close behind us in Torpids, and a 3-second gap over the 2 km course at Bedford, we used this as a focus point for the rest of the term's training.

Once Torpids was upon us, apprehension was running high. For all bar one in the boat, it was our first time racing in W1, and being at the head of the river! Despite this, the crew put their very best effort in from the start gun to the finish line. Being at the head of the river, we had Pembroke in hot pursuit, steered by none other than Erin Kennedy OBE (2x Paralympic gold medal winner). We managed to hold Pembroke off through the gut until they finally started catching up and sadly bumping us at the end of Greenbanks.

After a refreshing night's sleep and the disappearance of first-day nerves, Univ W1 was back at the start line, this time starting behind Pembroke and in front of Christ Church.

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Our start was much cleaner, and our rowing was more technical, which allowed us to apply more power. Unfortunately, about 200m in, the race was klaxoned due to swans in the racing line.

The third day was another day of clean rowing. Our crew rowed powerfully past Univ boathouse but were unfortunately caught by Christ Church on the final stretch of the Isis.

The final day was a very positive one. With a third-place start, we set out to hold our place as third-best on the river. It was some of our best racing, being technically and physically strong. We were able to cross the finish lines with our heads held high, having left Oriel (who started behind us) in the dust.

After a weekend of post-Torpids celebrations, it was time to get back on the water to prepare for WEHoRR. Being a relatively inexperienced crew, only two of us had ever rowed on the tideway, and it was the first long-distance piece we had done as a crew. But we rose to this fun challenge and successfully and powerfully managed to navigate the tideway, with some of us managing to catch a tan along the way. The crew managed to complete the course with an impressive time of 23:02.6 being 3rd out of 8 Oxford colleges and interestingly, beating Pembroke!

With the end of a successful term, there is great potential in the crew for the following term. Summer Eights is a big milestone in the Oxford rowing calendar, and we are set on defending our third-place position on the river. There are also other highlights for the future, including City Bumps, BUCS, Bedford Regatta, and Henley Women's Regatta. With a busy few months coming up for the boat club, training is of the utmost importance these holidays. With the Easter training challenge in full swing, we hope to hit the water fit and strong, ready for another term's worth of racing and fun!

On the back of our competitive Winter training challenge which took place remotely over the vac, we were all looking forward to getting back on the water. At Bedford Head we sent our M2 crew out, packed with this year's most keen novices. We went on to compete with a range of crews from across the country, placing 6th in our band. It was a shame not to get closer to the top three, but considering a lack of training on the water at the beginning of term (river closures made the return to Oxford tricky) it was great to see the lads make it down the course anyway, experiencing more competitive racing.
